View from the Chair

Elections seem to be all around us this year. There are 195 countries across the globe. 64 countries, that is 49% of the people in the world, will be going to the polls at some time this year, including the UK. The results will inevitably determine the shape of the world to come. In some countries, voting is compulsory - Singapore, Australia, Greece, Argentina to name a few. In the majority of countries, it is a citizen's choice whether to vote or not. We hear more people in this country are disinclined to vote, influenced maybe by the inability of politicians to deliver on their promises or the unacceptable conduct of some of them. Whether you vote or not is your choice, but either way, someone or some political party will be in power because of those who went to a polling booth and put a cross on their voting form. The successful candidates will be responsible for determining the public services you receive, how much you pay for them and how effective they are and whether they meet your needs. We hear that many young voters (over 18s) are reluctant to make their choices at the ballot box. A tragedy in my view. Your

politicians need to hear your views, your priorities and be influenced by them. What do vou want for the families and communities of the future? Voting is as simple or complex as you want to make it. But it does involve critical thinking skills, weighing up the pros and cons. What have your candidates done to improve the lives of others, are they trustworthy, do they put their communities first? Listen to what candidates sav about each other, their motivations, the example they set. Are they truly interested in combating climate change, do they understand the challenges of living in a rural community where public transport is limited, do they appreciate what it is like being a young person in an area that feels unsafe? And then there are the myriads of elections that take place every year at annual general meetings when an association, club or local organisation choose their Committee positions. Any role on a Committee comes with a degree of power and authority. As a voter you entrust these people to do their job, as a chairperson, treasurer, secretary and to do it with kindness, diligence and expertise. Who puts them there? We all do by



voting, or not. By not voting you let others have their say but any views you have – and we all have those! - will not be taken into account. You will have to roll with the majority. When it's all over I believe we, as citizens, then have a duty to hold to account those who have been elected. We need to question and support, as the successfully elected get on with their jobs, to help them be more effective.

The next Parish Council election is in 2027. Your Council has three more years to deliver on their priorities. Hold us to account, but also ask what can I do to contribute to my community's wellbeing.

Talking to the Young People

So often, regretfully, our children and young people get left out of the picture when it comes to planning services and new facilities. The Parish Council is trying to put that right. Cllrs Anthony Vanterpool and Marianne Stevenson arranged to meet groups of students with the assistance of staff at Glossopdale School. We particularly wanted to find out what activities we could provide in a new Community Centre and how we could make more effective use of the Sexton Street field. The young people we listened to were not short of ideas! We have splendid and well-run football and cricket clubs which are attracting an increasing

number of children and young people, but if that is not your thing, then what else is there? This list gives you an idea of the range of activities they came up with ~ netball, orienteering, film club, cooking classes, rounders, an arts & crafts club, cricket nets, basketball, archery, somewhere just to cool down and chat to their friends, a homework club, a youth club, a reading club, a drama club, challenges in the summer holiday. They liked the space to kick a football around on the Sexton Street field but was there any chance of levelling it? They liked the tennis/basketball

court area but, rightly pointed out, it needs repairs and, if possible, enlargement. Some of the students liked the idea of a Youth Council, where they could be trained as young councillors to feed ideas and opinions into the current Parish Council. Councillors are working on what can be provided in the short term. Meanwhile do keep the ideas coming and the Parish Council will search for funds to make it happen. A huge thank you to our young people who joined the sessions, for making the time and sharing your suggestions.

Improving river water quality in Tintwistle

Here at United Utilities, we're taking action to improve river health in your area. We've carried out, and continue to carry out, wastewater treatment upgrades in Derbyshire, with more schemes planned at our works in Glossop, Whaley Bridge and Chapel-en-le-Frith.

We are also making significant investment in our operations to increase the treatment capacity of our works in Tintwistle. This investment will help to reduce storm overflow spills into the River Etherow, protecting wildlife and habitats in the area.

Stop the Block

Millions of pounds are spent cleaning drains and sewers right across our region because of products that shouldn't be in them. Wet wipes, period products, cotton buds, nappies and dental floss are just some of the culprits. Flushed wet wipes don't just disappear down the u -bend and disintegrate, they clump together and cause havoc in the pipes, drains and sewers.

Doing your bit for Tintwistle

Did you know you can help improve river water quality too? By making small changes to your daily habits, you can help to protect your home, neighbourhood and the River Etherow.

Only flush the 3Ps down your loo – that's Pee, Poo and (toilet) Paper

Put all wet wipes, period products and bathroom rubbish in the bin.

Please also remember to scrape cooled cooking oils, fats and any leftover food waste into the bin. Cooking fats and oils can also create blockages known as 'fatbergs' (a congealed mass of fats, oils and bathroom rubbish) which clog up the underground sewer pipes. Blockages can lead to sewer flooding in homes and the environment.

Thank you for your help in protecting the River Etherow.

CofE Primary School have been creating a Well Dressing at the small well further down Old Road. They did a most effective Well Dressing, also commemorating the D Day Landings.



That Road? We're on it....I



National Highways (NH) is responsible for the A628 which passes through Crowden, Tintwistle and on to Hollingworth. The Parish Council has developed a strong working relationship with the Regional Route Manager. This means we can get timely information in advance of press releases and gain details which are specific to the Parish.

The Village Gateway Scheme, which the Parish Council instigated with NH for quietening and pacifying traffic speeds, is well underway in the planning stages and it is expected to be delivered during the later part of this year and early 2025. It will also include road resurfacing and grid improvements. Repairs to the dilapidated stone walls and accumulated rubbish, along The Woodhead Road between Millbrook and Saltersbrook, are being dealt with by NH on a piecemeal schedule. They do not merit partial road closures alone, only when other roadworks are being carried out and the damaged walls are nearby.

The poor state of 'The Cat's Eyes' along the A628 is a matter of concern for NH and villagers, who have seen these loosen and become projectiles due to traffic and road use. This repair and revision is in the final stages of being addressed and acted upon.

The improved street lighting seems to be very effective and trouble-free but we have brought to NH's attention any overhanging tree foliage which is causing darkened areas. They are planning to remove the excess tree growth. The Parish Council strives to enable this busy road to be as safe as possible for residents and road users alike. Any defects that you notice, when brought to our attention, can be forwarded & reported to NH.

We are taking stock of the state of grids/gullies through Tintwistle/Crowden. We shall take photographs and provide a damage description, then submit these to NH for appraisal so that comprehensive work proа gramme can be considered. Improvements and repairs to potholes, grids and lighting on our side roads, however, are not under the jurisdiction of National Highways but are the responsibilities of Derbyshire County Council. We, and our Borough Councillor, Rob Baker, are constantly reporting the defects and difficulties that residents face.

The Parish Council has no powers or the budget to carry out any roadworks ourselves, but we can constantly badger the authorities to provide safe speeds, adequate maintenance and flood prevention for the safety and wellbeing of our village residents.

The 80th Anniversary of the D-Day Landings - Thursday 6 June 2024

This was a significant event in the Tintwistle War Memorial Association's calendar. It was supported by Tintwistle Parish Council, who had secured a grant from High Peak Borough Council. The grant contributed to the flowers for this year's Well Dressing, the subject of both the Tintwistle CofE School's and the Tintwistle Well Dressing Association's was the D Day Landings.

From 8.30pm people began to assemble around the Cenotaph, the bunting fluttering gently in the chilly wind, while 1940's songs were being played. Norman Winterbottom had taken his impressive American 1940's jeep out of mothballs and stationed it by the Memorial for all to examine. Cllr Shaun Grace supported by local children, Tilly, Willow & Billy lit up the Beacon. Gary Brierley played the original recording of General Eisenhower's announcement of the 'Overlord' invasion of the Normandy beaches, which had involved the largest number of servicemen and women in recorded history. We all stood motionless during the two-minute silence, as we dwelt on this extraordinary anniversarv.

In addition, the grant has funded



two pink cherry trees, one of which will be planted on the grassy bank by the Cenotaph and the other in the churchyard at St James' Chapel. We shall let you know when the tree planting ceremony will take place, and all will be invited to attend. Plaques will be installed commemorating the anniversary.

Thank you everyone who came out on a very chilly night to remember the brave service people who lost their lives that day 80 years ago.
